

Winter 2009-2010 Redesign Challenges

PERFORMANCE PLATFORM

At a duly called meeting; held on Monday, November 2, 2009. There was a quorum present and one proxy vote was acknowledged. After extensive discussion and by a majority vote it was agreed that:

1. The current platform is not to be moved. Repairs would be made to strengthen its support.
2. A Tool Shed will be placed on it. Further study would be made on putting a new performance platform near the shaded Sitting area: which would be more accessible and impinge Jess on planting areas.
3. Feasibility for electricity supply, also needs to be investigated with Con Ed.

CAT RESERVE SHELTER


It has been shown, unfortunately, that there is not enough volunteer support to keep both, control of the cats and garden for food safely. Yet; the problem of feral cats, is still an issue. The cat shelter needs to be enclosed. All the resident cats need to be captured, treated, and moved to homes or suitable shelters. The shelter would remain for the required isolation of cats who have been treated, before they are relocated. We will support neighborhood humane efforts, but we can no longer be a domicile for cats.

TREE CENSUS ADJUSTMENT

Early this year we received advice from two professionals: that the two large trees should be removed. We thought maybe one: but not both. After observing the smaller tree provide berries for so many new visitors this Spring; it became evident which tree would be spared the axe. Thanks to donations by Matt and Norbu; we have a new growth in the number of trees supported by the garden. So the larger Chokeberry tree (a very root invasive kind) must go. This loss will allow for improvements to the shaded seating area, including a new performance platform.
